CHANGING OF THE GUARD

The Honors Program saw some administrative transitions this fall. After 18 years as Director on the Dahlonega campus, Dr. Steve Smith moved into the Assistant Director role, and Dr. Royce Dansby-Sparks took the reins. Dansby-Sparks, associate professor of Chemistry, is excited for the opportunity to lead UNG Dahlonega's high-performing students, with field trips, undergraduate conferences, and leadership development activities on this year's schedule.

On the Oconee campus, Honors Director Katherine Kipp retired in May 2019, and Dr. Pam Sezgin, professor of anthropology, stepped into the leadership role. Dr. Sezgin plans to focus on recruiting and retention this year, with the intention of fostering a vibrant Honors learning community on her campus.

After four very successful years as Dean of Honors, Dr. Tanya Bennett decided to return to full-time teaching. Dr. Bennett provided outstanding leadership, guidance, and vision for the programs during her tenure. Much of the excellence of today's Honors Programs at UNG is directly attributable to Dr. Bennett's enthusiasm, initiatives and vision. Bill Gash, Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs – Gainesville, will be working with the campus directors during the 2019 – 2020 academic year.

UNG HONORS PROGRAM ROLLS OUT NEW RESEARCH AND INNOVATION COURSE

As a component of the Honors Research and Innovation Minor, Honors offered HNRS 3500 Research and Innovation for the first time in spring 2019. As the first two students to declare the new minor, Taylor Malasek and Jessie Jensen served as the first team of Honors Program students to partner with a local entity through HNRS 3500 for the benefit of the community. Malasek and Jensen were connected with UNG Student Health Services to help with a project exploring local honey's effectiveness in reducing rhinitis for North Georgians. Nurse practitioner Stella Head and health educator Meri-Leigh Smith designed the study to include volunteer subjects from both on- and off-campus. Supporting this research project's launch, the students worked with Head and Smith to establish a volunteer-recruitment and retention plan in support of the project.

The goal of the course is to provide students with project management and execution experience for the direct benefit of the community. Malasek explained, "It [the course] required me to determine the goal, create a plan, and work with others to reach the best outcome possible." Students reviewed previous studies on honey as a treatment for rhinitis, as well as research on volunteer recruitment and retention. They visited local businesses to determine optimum recruitment venues and surveyed UNG students regarding factors that might deter participation in the study. "It [this project] has shown me the importance of bringing together the local citizens and the campus," said Jensen.

Dr. Tanya Bennett, who taught the class, said that the challenge of an unexpectedly delayed IRB approval required Malasek and Jensen to adjust the scope of their plan and manage client expectations, and they did so admirably. "The students' respectful and enthusiastic interactions with the community helped to build trust for future collaborations of this kind," said Bennett.
