Meet Chase Sanger '12

Currently a key member of the staff of US Representative Barry Loudermilk of Georgia's 11th District, Chase took some time out of his busy schedule recently to join us on our Dahlonega campus to share with you a little of his journey from high school student to congressional staffer.

Chase grew up in Cobb County, GA, and after graduating from Dominion Christian High School, Chase knew he wanted to join the military. So the University of North Georgia, with its unique Corp of Cadets program, seemed like the right fit for him.

During his time at UNG, Chase continued to feed his love for politics by majoring in political science and reaching towards his goal of joining the military by joining the Corp of Cadets and being a part of Charlie company.

Within the PSIA department, Chase said he was able to gain "a great foundation and understanding of issues." Looking back on his four years at UNG and in the PSIA department, Chase specifically recalled the impact of Dr. Cavalli's congressional course as well as Dr. Miner's and Dr. Harris' international politics courses.

Chase attributes his leadership skills, whether on active duty or working on a U.S. Congressman's staff were thanks to "getting to interact with different professors, advisors, and military science department staff [at UNG]"

After graduating with a bachelor's degree in political

science in 2012, Chase went on to get commissioned active duty with the Army in the chemical branch. Then after his time in the Army ended around four years later, Chase sought out a career in his passion: politics. After opening the "Global Programs Office" at Texas A&M School of Law, Chase began applying for jobs via USA Jobs, a site listing federal job openings.

When browsing USA Jobs, Chase stumbled upon the Wounded Warrior Fellowship Program in Congressman Loudermilk's Office. The fellowship peaked Chase's interest with it being in politics and because it was in his home Congressional district. Chase applied for the fellowship and was accepted. He spent two years in this fellowship and then when his program ended Congressman Loudermilk offered Chase a full-time job on his staff.

Chase describes his role current role as community relations: "I'm [Congressman Loudermilk's] representative at the Chambers of Commerce and business associations. I liaise with county and city governments, and state-level elected officials."

When asked about advice he had for perspective and current students, Chase said that prospective students, when deciding on a major, need to "look at what your passions are and try to align those passions with a degree." To current students, Chase emphasizes the importance of being involved in one's academic career and not just going through the motions -- "really engage with your classes and professors."

Meet Ben Jarrard '13

Currently a member of the PSIA Advisory Board, Ben recently received the impressive achievement of being named to the "20 Under 40" class of 2024 by the UNG Alumni Association's Young Alumni Board.

Ben is the son of a military officer and therefore moved around a lot in his younger years until eventually graduating from Lumpkin County High School here in Dahlonega. He then moved a few miles up the road to pursue a degree in Political Science, with a Mandarin Chinese minor, at UNG. During his time in college, he played golf on the Division II team, was a cadet, did one year in SGA, and joined a fraternity.

After graduating from UNG in 2013, Ben was offered the opportunity to work on then Governor Nathan Deal's reelection campaign after having previously interned with Gov Deal a year earlier. Following this, he returned to UNG to work in the newly-opened Government Relations office for five years. After serving as Chief of Staff for two years for another UNG Alum, State Senator Steve Gooch (MPA '98), Ben recently left to serve as Campaign Manager for former State Senator Mike Dugan.

Through the PSIA department and the cadet program, Ben was able to develop his leadership skills at UNG. He also learned how to be a good follower and have good discipline. Also, he feels that his research and writing skills, developed through his political science degree coursework, have helped him tremendously during his career. He also appreciates how the department taught him how to think like a political scientist.

Reflecting on his selection as one of the UNG Alumni Association's 2023 "20 Under 40" cohort, Ben said:

It was a tremendous honor. You talk about impostor syndrome in the workplace. That's certainly what I was feeling a little bit of. Going to the event and being surrounded by my fellow North Georgia graduates who had received awards and hearing their stories. I really just feel lucky to be in the room with them...I feel like a lot of my success was timing -- being in the right place and then taking advantage of being in the right place at the right time. I just feel very fortunate to be considered among that group of people. Makes me want to be a better person and work harder to really continue to prove myself that you deserve something like that, and so I'm grateful for it.

For current and future students, Ben has a simple piece of advice: "always be learning and always be open to learning." In addition, he encourages students to make sure they are doing internships because "networking is critical."

Second Friedman Scholarship Awarded



Fatima Santillan, a Gainesville campus-based junior Political Science major with a pre-law concentration, has been awarded the Dr. Barry Friedman Scholarship in Political Science & International Affairs for the 2024-2025 Academic Year. She follows in the footsteps of Victoria Landa, our inaugural recipient.

The \$1,000 grant comes courtesy of our PSIA Department scholarship which seeks to make learning more affordable, reward students that study hard and succeed academically, and show our students that the PSIA department truly cares about them. The scholarship is named in honor of Professor Emeritus Dr. Barry Friedman, professor of political science from 1992-2021.

The Scholarship Selection Committee, headed by Associate Department Head Dr. Viman-Miller, selected Fatima after receiving various deserving and high-quality submissions.

When asked about the selection process and what made Fatima stand out, Dr. Viman-Miller said that "Fatima is a hard-working student with big dreams and a bright future ahead. We had a lot of deserving applicants, but Fatima's' submission stood out because of her academic credentials and the breadth of her involvement with the department. We want to congratulate her and let her know how proud we are of all her

achievements so far."

Fatima hails from Gainesville, GA and is a graduate of Gainesville High School. When asked how she felt about being awarded the Dr. Barry D. Friedman Scholarship, Fatima said "When I first got the email I felt an incredible relief off of my shoulders because I come from a single income household and I'm a first generation student, so having an education is something that I value and something that I don't take for granted." She continued:

In my past education I had been told to limit myself and be more realistic with what I wanted to do. However, when I got to the University of North Georgia and startedworkingwiththePoliticalScience & International Affairs Department, I had a completely different experience. My professors were so supportive from the moment I walked into the classroom, especially Dr. Chand, Dr. Trey Wilson, and Dr. Dwight Wilson. They emphasized that these limitations were placed on me my whole academic journey, but they are what gives me this unique perspective to offer, and they should be used as strengths not weaknesses. That's why this scholarship means so much to me, because now I can keep funding my education and I can keep striving for my dream of being an immigration attorney and giving back to my community.

Meet Victoria Landa '24 2023 Friedman Scholarship Awardee

Senior Victoria Landa was born and raised in Macon, Georgia where she attended Covenant Academy and graduated in 2020. Before joining the #PSIAfamily and starting her degree in International Affairs (IA) with a European Concentration, she fell in love with the subject matter. Favoring the subject of history during high school but having an interest in current events, she decided to pursue a bachelor's degree in Internatinal Affairs. Victoria decided to come to UNG for multiple reasons, the first being that she had heard about the University's strong Political Science department. She also chose UNG for its atmosphere -- having grown up near a military base and having family members in the military, Victoria liked the idea of being surrounded by the "culture, discipline, and patriotism" found on campus.

Since coming to UNG and joining the PSIA department, Victoria has pursued not only a degree in International Affairs but also two minors, one in Public Administration and Public Service, and another in Spanish.

While Victoria admitted her schedule has been super busy, she makes it clear that "It's not something that anybody couldn't handle if you really put your mind to it. A lot of my professors have challenged me over the years and my classes, which is something I was looking forward to school anyways."

Since Victoria pursued several academic paths

through her major and minors, Victoria has had a well-rounded experience at UNG and more specifically within the PSIA department. "I would say [my] major, [while] heavy on reading on research and everything, [it] is super, super helpful and applicable to real-world skills writing. Especially, I would say I've written a lot of essays in my time here, but I think that the support that my professors have given me along the way has made [the work and] my crazy academic schedule doable." Victoria continues:

My most recent addition to my academic career has been the Public Administration and Public Service minor. It was recently introduced to me by Dr. Armstrong Williams, Dr. Kelly and Dr. Viman-Miller. Pursuing a second minor wasn't really on my mind. I mean [the minor] didn't exist before this year, but I would have never thought to do something like that until taking Dr. Kelly's Public Administration class and then Dr. Gershtenson's Public Policy class, and I just felt like the relevance of these classes to our everyday lives as Americans and the knowledge that I gained from these classes is really important.

Victoria's latest achievement is being the firstever recipient of the Department's Dr. Barry D. Friedman Scholarship. When asked about receiving this scholarship, Victoria said: "It was a tremendous honor to receive this. I was excited, especially after having met Dr. Barry and the faculty. It was just amazing to get to know them. So, needless to say, it was a huge honor."

Victoria has some advice for prospective students seeking a degree with PSIA. "Keep going! I know it's hard, but it's worth reaching out to all your professors and advisors. I found that it might be a little intimidating at first to go up to the professor and ask some questions, but I've learned over the years not to be intimidated because they're so willing to help you. So, I would say just be bold and determined."

Another Successful SRMUN

Our Model UN clubs and Model UN courses came together this past November to participate in the 2023 Southern Regional Model United Nations (SRMUN) conference in Atlanta, GA. While there was no theme for this year's conference, students discussed topics ranging from the global debt crisis to protection of world heritage sites to the housing crisis and combating disinformation.


This year's conference included over 471 delegates (77 delegations) from 32 universities. Twenty-eight PSIA students from across the Dahlonega and Gainesville campuses represented five countries: France, Vietnam, Croatia, India, and Singapore. In addition, we also had one of our students on SRMUN staff this year. Jessica Case (IA '25) served as the Assistant Director (AD) of the General Assembly Plenary Committee.

Since UNG was representing France, our UNG students had the unique opportunity to talk with the Consul General Anne-Laure Desjonquères from the Consulate General of France in Atlanta. The Consul General graciously took time out of her busy schedule to talk with our students in the French delegation about her career, French foreign policy, and negotiation skills.



Given Dr. Wilson's expertise in Latin American studies, this book is poised to provide invaluable insights in an important field of study in an area geographically near to all of us. Through meticulous research and analysis, the trio delve into the complex dvnamics of financialization. austerity and inclusive development measures. strategies, shedding light on their profound implications for the region's societies and economies.

Published by Romania's Presa Universitară Clujeană, The War in Ukraine and its Impact on Global Politics and Security covers a wide range of topics authored by both US and Romanian authors including PSIA's Drs. Craig Greathouse, Seyed Serri, Laurel Wei, Nathan Price and Jon Miner.

The conflict in Ukraine remains a critical issue, particularly concerning its implications for global politics and security. This book provides valuable insights into the complexities of the situation, making it essential reading for those seeking a deeper understanding of this pressing matter.

Department head Dr. Craig Greathouse and Dr. Austin Reade from UNG'S English Department edited a collection of articles looking at various US national security issues in the context of the lead-up to and conduct of World War I.

Published by UNG's University Press and featuring authors from a diverse range of academic disciplines, **US Security Issues and World War I** was designed not to follow the traditional emphasis on the foreign policy and

military aspects and events of the Great War, but rather to consider the broader impact of the war on national security issues within the United States and on US foreign policy.

As is usually the case with books compiled by one of our faculty members, several of the chapters in this anthology were authored by fellow PSIA members, including Drs. Raluca Viman-Miller, Seyed Serri and Jon Miner.

UNG President Visits PSIA

UNG President Dr. Michael Shannon took time out his day on March 4th, 2024 to share some insights and advice with PSIA students and faculty members based on his experiences in academia, government and the military.

President Shannon opened his discussion by expressing how students have no idea where their journey will take them, which from his perspective and based on his diversity of experiences throughout his career should be exciting because "your journey will give you opportunities to explore things."

The president spent most of his time discussing several key ideas PSIA students should keep in mind as they move forward during their academic careers. First, and he was quite emphatic: "The nation needs you...we need good people of high character that want to take on the work of our social constructs, our community constructs. We need great people that are value centered, that think creatively and innovatively about the challenges ahead of us..."

Throughout his talk President Shannon expressed a basic worldview he believes students will find most beneficial once they venture into the world after college: "I don't believe in challenges -- I believe in opportunities."


Going to a college far away from home allowed President Shannon to meet a variety of people. Along this same vein, President Shannon expressed how his experience oversees in the Army showed him a new perspective, as well as how important empathy is to have as you go through life. "We've got to be empathetic...I would encourage you to interact with as many people who don't look like you as possible. You will learn a lot and you will be able to operate inside of this experiment [called the United States].

President Shannon emphasized the importance of getting through Political Science courses as they will provide students with the necessary tools to be successful to be successful in the world. "You have to do incredibly well in your courses".

To end his discussion President Shannon answered questions from the audience with one important point being how much opportunity students have here at UNG, not just in Dahlonega but at other campuses as well.

PSIA and the Forsyth County Public Library once again collaborated during the Spring 2024 semester in presenting the *Great Decisions* series, America's largest discussion on world affairs to the North Georgia community

This year's faculty members participating in the Great Decisions series (see photo above) presented information and led discussions on a range of fascinating and timely geopolitical topics. Topics were selected based on their current importance to international affairs including political, economic, and diplomatic issues.

UNG has provided presentations for the *Great Decisions* lecture series for over a decade, providing a public forum for the discussion of current foreign policy issues facing the United States.

The first *Great Decisions* group was organized in 1954 around informal presentation and conversation. Since then, the Foreign Policy Association has produced the Great Decisions series annually. The meetings are meant to be flexible educational experiences that are accessible through schools, libraries, community centers, and faith-based organizations across the nation.
