Benjamin Smith Leads the Nation

A tremendous "WELL DONE" to Cadet Benjamin Smith, recognized by the US Army's Cadet Command as the No. 1 overall Army ROTC cadet out of 5,538 graduating nationally for the 2025-26 academic year.

Ben achieves this accolade eleven years after IA major Jonathan Strickland, '14 achieved that same distinction.

Ben, from Decatur, TN, is an SSST / Military Science major. He said being the No. 1 cadet "was a pleasant surprise."

It may have been to him, but probably no to his peers and his professors. Some of his cadet career highlights include:

- Graduating from Air Assault School and Jungle School and attending Sapper School, all of which are Army specialty schools. He was the honor graduate of his Air Assault School class, and he was one of three UNG cadets to earn the Jungle Tab this past summer.
- Overseas experience at military academies in Poland and Latvia.
- A pair of stints at the Swiss Army mountaineering courses.
- Commander, Boar's Head Brigade's Mountain Order of Colombo.

We in the PSIA Department are exceptionally proud of Ben, and wish him all the best in his future Army career.

Twenty-five percent of the UNG students designated earlier this spring as Fulbright semifinalists for 2025-26 are members of the #PSIAfamily!

Class of '26 International Affairs/French double major Sara Gonzalez;

May 2025 graduate Political Science/Pre-law major Fatima Santillan; and

December 2024 graduate Political Science/Pre-law major Tracy Amaya.

Of these four, we have THREE selectees -- one of our students was selected to travel to Spain; and another two were named as alternates.

Tracy is heading to Spain as an English teaching assistant (ETA), while Fatima and Sara, who also have their sights on an ETA position in Spain, have been named as alternates.

When she received news of her selection, Tracy wrote her advisor, Dr. Bibek Chand:

"To say that I am honored and humbled would be an understatement. I hope to continue making the PSIA Department proud and hopefully encourage more students to pursue similar opportunities."

The U.S. State Department's Fulbright program enables graduates to pursue research activities, become English teaching assistants, or enroll in graduate school in other countries. It is designed to increase mutual understanding between U.S. citizens and residents of more than 160 foreign countries, according to the Fulbright website.

Congratulations to these members of our #PSIAfamily who have excelled as students and who together contributed to UNG being named one of the Fulbright programs "Top Producing Institutions" for 2025-26!



UNG's 2025 Meridian-Cox Foreign Service Fellow

Senior political science major Claudia Marban spent her final undergraduate summer participating in the Meridian-Cox Foreign Service Fellowship for Emerging Leaders. Selected as one of just 20 students nationwide, and one of two UNG students, Claudia gained hands-on insight into careers in the Foreign Service through this fully-funded program.

A resident of Gillsville, GA and a graduate of East Hall High School, Claudia first became interested in diplomacy while participating in Model United Nations at UNG. The fellowship offered her an opportunity to explore her passion more deeply and think about her future career path.

During the program, Claudia visited the United Nations Information Center and the Peace Corps, met with diplomats and Foreign Service officers, and participated in workshops highlighting the realworld challenges of a diplomatic career. For Claudia, the fellowship provided invaluable insight into what a career in the Foreign Service really entails.

Associate PSIA professor Dr. Bibek Chand, mentor to Claudia on our Gainesville campus said:

"This selective fellowship was a great opportunity for our students to get a glimpse of Foreign Service opportunities and experience professional networking in D.C. [Claudia has] gone above and beyond to seek opportunities for professional development. Apart from being very engaged on campus, [she has] consistently sought external opportunities. The fellowship challenges students to think about long-term career choices and the importance of engaging outside of one's comfort zones. I am confident that Claudia gained great experiences that will inform her career trajectories."

With her roots in Gainesville, her UNG education, and the experience gained from the Meridian-Cox Fellowship, Claudia is excited to pursue a career in diplomacy that will allow her to make a meaningful impact in international relations.

Kudos to our PSIA cadets, who are among the 37 members of the Boar's Head Brigade that earned Distinguished Military Graduate (DMG) status for the 2025-26 academic year. Special kudos to SSST major Cadet Benjamin Smith, who was ranked #1 among all ROTC cadets in the country. (see article pg. 3)

DMG recognition is given by the US Army's Cadet Command to commissioning cadets who finish in the top 20% of Army ROTC graduates on the national Order of Merit List. Cadets join the list by achieving superior grade-point averages, strong performance in the Army Fitness Test, and proving their worth as exceptional leaders in their college ROTC training. The DMG designation remains on their Army record throughout their military career.

Senior cadet Mia Libosada, from Marietta, was interviewed by UNG News. Mia is an IA /Asia major with a minor in Korean and has won the nationally competitive Boren and Critical Language scholarships. That funding allowed her to study abroad at Yonsei University and Pusan University in South Korea. She also took part in a military exchange at the Korean Military Academy. In total, she has spent about two years studying in South Korea. Mia is currently completing an internship at the Daniel K. Inouye Asia-Pacific Center for Security Studies in Honolulu, Hawaii, before commissioning in December.

"All of these experiences have exposed me to different people, perspectives and the goals of various nations," Mia told UNG News. "These opportunities have prepared me well for what I will be facing as a newly commissioned second lieutenant in the Army."

CONGRATULATIONS Professor Dr. Eric Wilk, the 2025 recipient Viman-Miller, who oversees our Gainesville of the University of North Georgia's faculty, was not surprised --Distinguished Teaching Award!

Presented by UNG's Center for Teaching, Learning, and Leadership (CTLL), the award recognizes excellence in teaching by a faculty member over the course of a distinguished career. CTLL's Award Review Committee recognized Eric's exceptionally strong "alignment with the award criteria including his teaching philosophy, methodical examination of practice, and continual improvement of teaching and learning." Additionally, the Committee highlighted his "history of sustained impact on student learning both in and out of the classroom."

"I'm humbled to win when there are so many great teachers here at UNG. From the beginning, teaching has brought a number of obstacles to someone who had a debilitating fear of public speaking, but God's grace has helped transform that fear into a strength."

Since joining PSIA in August of 2021, Dr. Wilk has been an integral member of our political science program on the Gainesville campus, focusing on American politics, statistics, and research design. He earned his Ph.D. in political science from the University at Buffalo (UB), SUNY in 2010 and a Master's Degree in political management at the George Washington University in Washington, DC in 2000.

CONGRATULATIONS to Associate Professor Dr. Nathan Price, who was named by UNG President Michael Shannon to serve as interim executive director of UNG's Blue Ridge Campus, effective Aug 1st, when the current executive director, Sandy Ott, retires.

As many of you know, Nathan has been PSIA's sole faculty member on the Blue Ridge Campus since it opened in 2015. Those of you who had him at the front of your classroom for either Global Issues, Intro to American Government, or Intro to Comparative Politics know first-hand his passion for helping students #experiencemore. In addition to his ten years in the UNG classroom, Nathan has led both the Blue Ridge Scholars program and Emerging Leaders Program.

Nathan is extremely honored to have been chosen for this position and is looking forward to entering a new phase of his professional career. While he will still be found in the Blue Ridge classrooms, although perhaps not as often as previously. he will be leading the Blue Ridge campus during what he sees will be an "exciting time." The campus recently opened its new "David E. Ralston Hall," named in honor of the late speaker of the Georgia House of Representatives and 1976 UNG Political Science major. Two main tenants of the Hall will be the Education program, currently on campus, and the Nursing program, scheduled to arrive in 2026. 4 + 1 Arrives



We have unveiled an exciting new opportunity for our most motivated students: the MAIA 4+1 Program. This initiative, set to be available to students beginning in the fall of 2026, will provide an accelerated pathway to a master's degree. Quite simply -- undergraduates will be able to earn both a bachelor's AND a master's degree in a total of just five years!

The program was created to help talented students fast-track their careers in international affairs while staying within the UNG community. "This initiative is about giving our students an edge...It allows them to deepen their expertise and enter the job market with both academic and practical advantages." Dr. Cristian Harris, Professor of Political Science and one of the program's two advisors said.

A Streamlined Pathway to Success

The MAIA 4+1 Program is open to Dahlonega campus-based students majoring in most of our degree programs -- Political Science, Political Science/Pre-Law, International Affairs, or Strategic and Security Studies (only the International Affairs concentration). During their final year as an undergraduate, students in the program can take four graduate-level courses that will count toward both degrees. After completing their undergraduate requirements, just one additional year of graduate study leads to the Master of Arts in International Affairs (MAIA).

The program's structure is intended to provide continuity in mentorship and instruction, as graduate students will be able to work with the same dedicated faculty members who guided them through their undergraduate studies. Summer courses will also be available to help participants stay on track or even get ahead.

Who Can Apply?

The application period will open each May, and juniors who have completed at least 80 credit hours (including 21 upper-division hours) will be eligible to apply. A minimum GPA of 3.25, two letters of recommendation, and a 600-word Statement of Purpose will be part of the application to help ensure students are ready to meet the challenges of graduate-level coursework while finishing their undergraduate degrees.

Preparing Global Leaders

The 4+1 Program was developed in response to growing student demand for programs that combine academic rigor, flexibility, and real-world preparation. In a field as interconnected and competitive as international affairs, this accelerated option provides students with a head start toward advanced careers in diplomacy, global policy, and international organizations.

As Dr. Harris explained, "Our graduates are entering a world that requires both deep knowledge and adaptability. The 4+1 Program gives them both—faster."

For students eager to lead in the international arena, UNG's MAIA 4+1 Program isn't just a degree path—it's a launchpad for global impact.

Once again, Dr. Eddie Mienie's National Intelligence Summer Academy (NISA) held on UNG's Cumming campus this past July was a resounding success for the high school students in attendance. Organized and led by Dr. Mienie, the program provided an intense and exciting look at the field of intelligence and the US Intelligence Community.

During the week-long program,

NISA attendees got to hear first-hand from practitioners in the field — from US agencies such as the National Security Agency, the Central Intelligence Agency and the Federal Bureau of Investigation, as well as from foreign organizations. Together, the speakers combined their experiences and insights to meet NISA's three primary goals — to lift the veil of secrecy on the

hidden world of intelligence; to provide a context for understanding the important role intelligence has played in our nation's history and continues to play today; and to provide a foundational knowledge of the intelligence field, setting the stage for possible careers in the field.

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RISE 2025 & the Friedman Scholarshi



RISE, UNG's annual crowdfunding campaign, is nearing its conclusion, officially ending November 7, 2025.

The RISE Campaign is organized by UNG's Alumni Association and seeks to raise money for specific UNG scholarships.

As we have the past several years, we continue the drive to fund our own PSIA scholarship, The Barry D. Friedman Scholarship in Political Science & International Affairs.

To date you have contributed nearly \$23,000 to the scholar-ship fund!

By the end of this current RISE campaign, we are hoping to reach the "magical" \$25,000 benchmark to make this scholarship endowed and self-perpetuating, so students for years to come can benefit from it.

We awarded the first scholarship in 2023. The three recipients of the scholarship, whom you met in the past three Spring Newsletters respectively, each received \$1,000 for their final academic year. Thanks to your generosity, future PSIA majors -- undergraduate students majoring in Political Science, International Affairs, or Strategic and Security Studies who have completed at least nine credit hours in POLS courses and who have a minimum cumulative GPA of at least a 2.75 -- will receive the same amount. Selections take place every spring semester.

The Barry D. Friedman Scholarship seeks to make learning more affordable, reward students that study hard, and show our students that the PSIA Department truly cares about them.

Professor emeritus Dr. Barry D. Friedman, former Department Head Dr. Dlynn Armstrong-Williams, and the department as a whole designed


