

Presidential Investiture of Michael P. Shannon

Michael P. Shannon, Ph.D.



The Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia named Dr. Michael P. "Mike" Shannon as UNG's president on June 1, and he took office July 1, 2023.

A native of New Jersey, President Shannon is a first-generation college graduate and was commissioned through Army ROTC. He holds a bachelor's degree in aerospace engineering and a master's in aeronautical science from Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University. He also holds a master's in health physics and a Ph.D. in nuclear and radiological engineering from the Georgia Institute of Technology.

President Shannon served as a commissioned officer in the U.S. Army for 20 years, retiring in 2015 with the rank of lieutenant colonel. After operational Army service as an Infantry and Signal Corps officer with assignments in the 82d Airborne Division, the 35th Signal Brigade (18th Airborne Corps) and the 2nd Infantry Division, he was selected to serve as a U.S. Army Nuclear and Counterproliferation officer.

For more than 10 years, he provided leadership and technical and operational expertise to the U.S. Department of Defense as an expert in nuclear technology issues and later held leadership assignments with the Defense Threat Reduction Agency. Shannon also served at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point during two different leadership assignments, as an instructor and later as an assistant professor in the Department of Physics and Nuclear Engineering. At West Point, he was actively engaged in teaching and research along with several activities in support of cadet and Army officer development.

Prior to joining the University of North Georgia, President Shannon served as a member of Georgia Tech's executive leadership team and was responsible for strategic leadership and operations of human resources, finance and budget, information technology, facilities and infrastructure, capital planning, campus security, and emergency response. In addition, he served in numerous faculty, leadership and advisory roles, including as a research faculty member and principal investigator in the Advanced Concepts Laboratory at the Georgia Tech Research Institute.

President Shannon continues to serve veterans' causes, is an active member of his church and is a coach for multiple local youth sports programs. He and his wife, Jessica, have four children.

The Symbols of Academic Tradition

Academic Regalia

Academic regalia dates to the Middle Ages, when it may have been necessary for scholars to wear gowns and cowls in the unheated halls of academe of the period. The robes and hoods have evolved as ceremonial garments that, in accordance with standards established by the American Council on Education, symbolize level of degree, academic field and the awarding institution.

Black robes and hoods are traditional for all degrees, but have various characteristics depending upon degree level and discipline. The associate degree and bachelor's degree robes have pointed sleeves. The master's degree robe has an oblong sleeve, with the rear part square cut and the front part cut away. The robe for the doctoral degree has bell-shaped sleeves. Robes for the bachelor's or master's degrees are untrimmed, while the robe for the doctoral degree is faced with black velvet and three bars of velvet across the sleeves.

The color of the velvet on robes and hoods may be black or distinctive to the field of study to which the degree pertains. The colors associated with academic disciplines are:

The Seal

The University of North Georgia seal incorporates symbols associated with the university's heritage and mission. The seal represents the university's highest authority and its use is reserved



One side of the seal depicts the steeple of Price Memorial Hall, which is on the National Register of Historic Places and represents the institution's establishment in 1873 upon the site of a United States mint that was significant to the region and state; the steeple is surrounded by the mountains and waterways that are integral to the communities of our region; laurel leaves symbolize academic and military achievement; and two stars represent the University of North Georgia's role as one of only six Senior Military Colleges in the nation and its designation by the University System of Georgia as a State Leadership Institution.

The other side of the seal features the UNG Corps of Cadets' crest, the Boar's Head Brigade. In addition to a boar's head, it includes the Cherokee Rose, the state flower of Georgia; crossed rifles; the corps motto — Truth and Wisdom; and the university's designation as The Military College of Georgia.



Once used as a battle weapon, the mace is frequently carried today in university ceremonies. The University of North Georgia mace is a 42-inch walnut staff that supports the UNG seal cast in bronze. The mace was given to the university by the Student Government Association in 2013 as a symbol of unification during the consolidation of Gainesville State College and North Georgia College & State University.

Presidential Regalia

The regalia for the president of the University of North Georgia includes several elements to be worn at ceremonial events to identify the president as the highest officer of the institution. The president's robe features four blue chevrons. The chain of office features a cast bronze medallion of the university seal supported by a chain with links upon which the names and years of office for previous presidents are engraved.

A ribbon of woven tapestry, featuring the gold steeple of Price Memorial Hall against a background of the mountains of North Georgia, adorns a velvet stole completing the president's regalia. The original tapestry was designed by Tommye Scanlin, Professor Emerita of Fine Arts, in 1993, to support the medallion worn by the president at that time. Scanlin and Jo-Marie Karst, instructor of visual arts, transformed the tapestry into a stole that continues its legacy as a part of the regalia for the president of the University of North Georgia.
