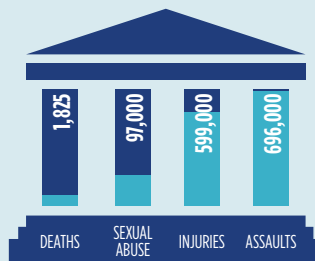

Alcohol Policy At UNG

Public Safety/UNG Police follow a policy of Zero Tolerance toward persons who violate the alcohol laws. These violations include but are not limited to underage drinking, driving under the influence, furnishing alcohol to underage persons, open container and public drunkenness. Arrests may be citation or actual booking into the local Detention Center. Students are also subject to referral to Student Judiciary for violation of the Student Conduct Code.

What are potential signs of a problem?

- Specific school problems such as poor attendance, low grades, and/or recent disciplinary action
- Drinking in situations that are physically dangerous, such as driving a car
- Having recurring alcohol-related legal problems, such as being arrested for driving under the influence of alcohol or for physically hurting someone while drunk
- Continued drinking despite having ongoing relationship problems that are caused or worsened by drinking

Alcohol Poisoning: What You Need To Know

Critical signs of Alcohol Poisoning

- Mental confusion, stupor, coma, or person cannot be roused
- Vomiting
- Seizures
- Slow breathing (fewer than eight breaths per minute)
- Irregular breathing (10 seconds or more between breaths)
- Hypothermia (low body temperature), bluish skin color, paleness

What should I do if I suspect someone has alcohol poisoning?

- Do not wait for all symptoms to be present
- Be aware that a person who has passed out may die
- If there is any suspicion of an alcohol overdose, call 911 for help

Don't let the use of alcohol have a negative impact on your college experience . . .
