

The Cornell Method is a great way to take notes in a way that makes it easy to review and study later.

Title and Date

Keywords & Questions

Soon after class, jot down key points and formulate questions based on notes.

Main Notes & Key Thoughts

During class, record lecture notes here.

Focus on...

- Key words and ideas
- Important dates, people and places
- Repeated information
- Ideas written on the board
- Information from the text
- Diagrams and Pictures
- Formulas

After class, consider...

- What's the significance of the information?
- How can I apply this new knowledge?
- What principle(s) is this information based on?
- How does this fit in to what I already know?
- What am I left thinking about this new learning?

Summary

After class, sum up each page of your notes in a sentence or two.

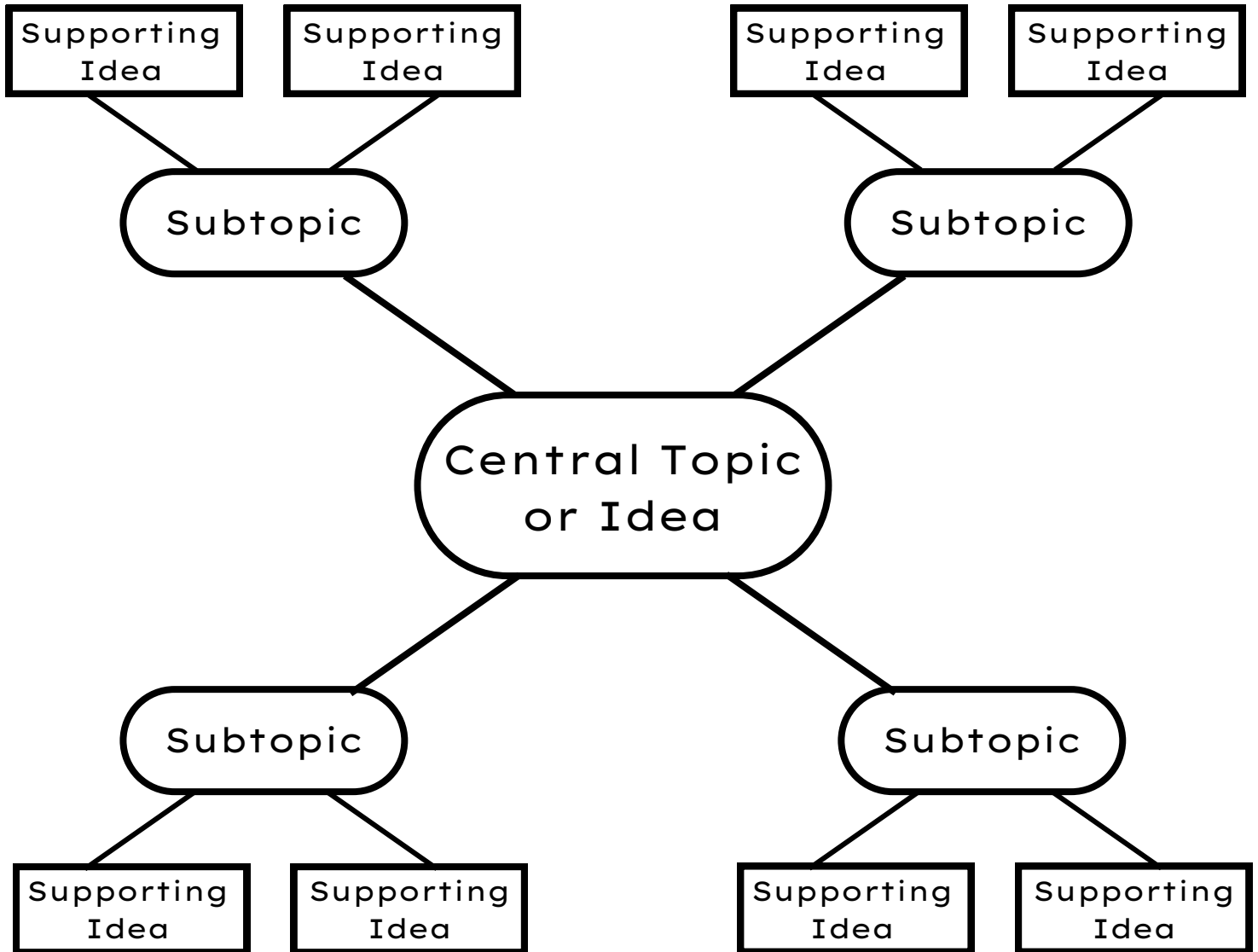

The Color Coding Method helps you streamline how you access and review your notes through a visual organizational structure.

Main Topic/Titles

Definitions

Key Events

Formula or Data

Key Person

Examples

Questions

Choose 3-4 colors and pair each one to an important focus of that class (examples to the left).

After taking notes in class, review the notes and color code important information based on the legend you created.

I am lost - ask for help!

I've almost got it - review

I've got this!

Try color coding a different way to indicate your level of comfort with class information

Stick to 3-4 main colors and the same color pattern.

Don't color code everything!

Use matching sticky notes to write additional thoughts and questions when studying.
